Linking Verbs

A **linking verb** tells what the subject is or is like. It connects the subject to a word or words in the predicate that name or describe the subject.

Tom is a camp counselor.

His job seems fun.

Maggie is a forest ranger.

She looks happy.

TFK Tips for Writers

When writing, pay attention to your choice of verbs. Some verbs can be used both as action verbs and as linking verbs. If you aren't sure if a verb is a linking verb, replace it with a form of the verb *to be*. If it makes sense, the verb is a linking verb.
